ArtWomen.org began with two friends talking via e-mail, a feminist curator in Texas and a feminist art historian in Washington, D.C. We decided to use the Internet to bring artwomen together on line to talk about issues of current interest. We were then organizing a roundtable for the 2000 National Women's Studies Association annual meeting, and the Internet was a convenient alternative to meetings that must be attended in person. Since that beginning we have added a lot to ArtWomen.

We're part of Amnesty International's Stop Violence Against Women Campaign in the UK; we're brainstorming with Greenpeace.
